of land and waterways in environmentally-significant areas of Northern Oakland County remains our focus.

The Beaver Deceiver

At the end of 2017, our land crew installed a Clemson Pond Leveler at a pesky beaver dam along the Clinton River north of Clarkston.

Home owners suffered from occasional flooding due to the dam. Rather than relocating the beaver, we installed a pond leveler.

The dam remains intact, but water is able to flow under the dam through PVC pipes. The beavers can't hear the water flowing through the pipes, so they are fooled into thinking the dam is secure. Future flooding is prevented.

Conserving the land, preserving the beaver's habitat and protecting nearby homes are all part of the NOHLC mission.



Repairing Land With Fire

Controlled burns have long been used as a tool in ecology and forestry to rejuvenate the land as well as clear out the old and make way for the new.

In 2017 the NOHLC contracted fire management personnel to conduct a controlled burn at our Sashabaw Creek property.

This controlled burn is just one part of a 5-year maintenance plan designed to mitigate human impact on the land and restore it to its natural beauty.

by local people on local land makes our organization special. Making a difference close to home is a dream for many.

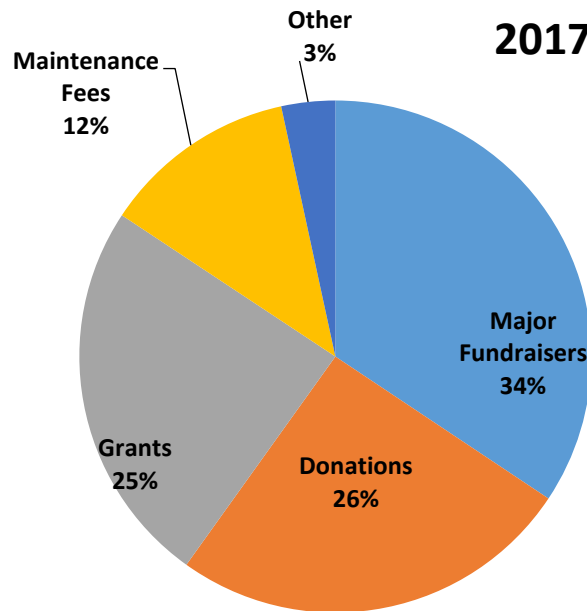
Investing in the Future
